That service includes, but not limited to her visiting the sick in nursing homes and hospitals, mailing encouragement cards to people who have lost loved ones or those going through chemotherapy and radiation treatment, and proctoring in schools.

Juliet Black, born in Atlantic City, New Jersey, relocated to Durham with her family when she was an infant. As a youth in Durham, she learned early on the importance of treating others respectfully, the importance of education, and being of service to others.

Davis was employed by the Durham Public Schools as an educator, officially retiring in February; however, he continues working in the school system even today.




Queen Elizabeth Wooten Lawrence was selected for the **2020 “Dare to Make a Difference” Award** for her **Service to Youth and Community category**.
